Housing supply clogged in system

Assistant Minister for Cities Angus Taylor correctly calls for improvements to the planning system ("More homes needed to meet growth demand", 5/1) to lift Sydney's housing supply to the 40,000 needed each year.

The highest number of new homes in the past 12 months is 31,000, so something major is required to increase supply by

30 per cent.

Currently only 58 per cent of homes approved become completed buildings because councils add so many conditions, so a special focus must occur on this issue.

We also need to question excessive design requirements like having 70 per cent of an apartment getting sun on the living room floor in midwinter. No other Australian city requires this.

Sydney also has very restrictive zoning rules that prohibit apartments in some town centres and in old industrial areas where changes of uses are needed. The Greater Sydney Commission must look at simplifying the planning system if we are going to get housing supply where it needs to be and that will help with housing affordability.
